From The President

I went off to see my granddaughter and missed the June meeting in Lafayette. Therefore, I missed Dick Atha, who I last saw playing for Indiana State Teachers College. State always had a tournament, as I remember, so I saw eight to ten years of great 1940's and 1950's college basketball right there in Terre Haute.

Which brings me to this: When I think about the major differences in basketball, then and now, several are obvious. For Example, the shot clock, three pointers, expanded lanes and of course the size and speed of players. But in my mind, and having by far the greatest impact has been the evolution of the dribble.

I occasionally see old basketball film and regularly see play today. The dribble has evolved, albeit gradually, into the carry. Virtually every sports magazine and newspaper during the basketball season has numerous action shots that show the dribbler with the basketball on top of his hands - clearly on top, not under or even in a side position. This has revolutionized the game, to my way of thinking, into low contact football. Is the game better off for this, or worse off? Maybe you'll let me know your view.

In closing, although I was not at the meeting, I would like to thank Lanny Sigo for arranging the meeting. I am told that he did a wonderful job.

Even though the next get together is a board meeting, I encourage members to attend. Although only Board Members can vote, others may voice opinions.

Four Would Be Nice

Multiple Winners

Prior to the 1939 Indiana State Tournament only four schools (Frankfort, Franklin, Lebanon and Martinsville) had claimed 3 championships. With Frankfort and Franklin advancing to the Final 4, there was a 50% chance of the 1939 tournament producing Indiana's first quadruple champion.

The Coaches

Three of this year's final 4 coaches (Everett Case-Frankfort, "Fuzzy" Vandivier-Franklin and Scott Fisher-Muncie Burriss) are in the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in New Castle. Case and Vandivier are in the Naismith Hall of Fame in Springfield, Massachusetts. The fourth probably should also be in the Hall of Fame.

Harry King, Evansville Bosse, played with Vandivier in 1922 when Franklin won the third of its three consecutive titles.

Bosse opened his doors in the 1924-25 season. In 1927-28, King took over as coach and almost immediately brought the basketball program to prominence by winning its first sectional in 1930. Then in 1932 he guided the Bulldogs to the Final 4, losing to Winamac by 4. Now in 1939, he is back again in the Final 4. However, the gods again did not shine on his Bulldogs, as Frankfort and Franklin advanced to the titular contest, thus assuring the state its first four time champion.

King coached one more year before entering the armed forces. Hall of Famer, Arad McCutchan then took over winning one sectional and a regional in three years. Then the job was handed to Hall of Famer, Herman Keller who then won Bosse's first two titles in 1944 and 1945. Another Hall of Famer, Clarence Riggs coached a year before moving over to Evansville Rietz. King then returned to coach four more years. Keller now comes back for 11 years, winning but two sectionals. Next in line comes Hall of Famer, James Myers to win Bosse's third title in 1962. Thus Harry King, the guy who put Bosse on the map as a southern basketball power was surrounded by Hall of Famers but has been overlooked in New Castle.

The Winner

In the big game Franklin most likely had the best player in George Crowe,

the younger brother of Ray Crowe who would lead Indianapolis Attucks to state titles in 1955 and 1956.

George became the state's first Mr. Basketball at season's end. But looking at the game boxscore it seems, however, that the Frankfort Hot Dogs had the more balanced team, with Laughner scoring 13, Cook 11 and Johnson 8. Crowe pitched in 13 tallies for the Franklin Grizzly Cubs, but the remainder of the starters scored but 9 points. So Frankfort won its fourth title. To this day, only Muncie Central (8) and Marion (7) can claim more.

Moving On

Everett Case coached 3 more years at Frankfort before entering the Navy. After his discharge he moved on to a stellar career at North Carolina State, bringing basketball, Hoosier style, to *Tobacco Road* and is it ever flourishing.

Robert "Fuzzy" Vandivier concluded his coaching career at his alma mater in 1944. In his 18 years there he won 14 sectionals, along with three regionals and the 1939 trip to the championship game.

George Crowe who went on to play professional baseball with the St. Louis Cardinals, is now living a peaceful retirement in the Adirondack Mountains of upstate New York.

(Mt. Olympus Mountaineers)

Their coach was Charles Robinson, who won the only sectional in his coaching career.

The starting five were Ed Daubenspeck, Bob Kell, Herdis Kolb, Roy Whitehouse and Earl Young.

After eliminating Mt. Vernon, Hazelton and Owensville to win the sectional, the Vincennes Alices eliminated them in the first game of the regional. They closed at 26-1. Following are their regular season victims.

A Trester Thing

Back in 1980 in a sectional game played between Peru and Maconaquah, something took place that is, most likely, a one time happening and probably won't take place again.

Three sons of Trester Award winners took part in this game. Rick Sexson (son of Joe) was coach at Maconaquah. Jim Haslam, a senior (son of Dick, the Maconaquah A.D.) was a sub for Maconaquah. Johnathan Plump, a junior (son of Bob) played for the Peru Tigers.

Of the three participants, only Rick Sexson came close to being in a position to win the Trester Award, which can only be awarded to a player on a final four team. In his senior year while playing for Lafayette Jeff, the Bronchos fell short losing in the semi-state.

There is one common thread among the three families. Dick Haslam, Rick Sexson and Bob Plump all played at Butler University, while Joe Sexson coached at the Indianapolis institution for several years.

Landon "Sonny" Cox Quits

CHICAGO (AP) --Since starting as Chicago King's head coach in 1981-82, Cox has produced 15 all-state players and 7 All-Americans, including Illinois Players of the Year Marcus Liberty, Jamie Brandon, Rashad Griffith and Leon Smith.

Cox said he decided to step down because King, a magnate school, has not enrolled a freshman in four years.

"I felt I couldn't go any further," Cox told the Chicago Sun-Times. "Getting kids is the lifeblood of any program. When they stop coming, the program dies."

He said he would consider another job but only at a school with a chance to win. "I never could get used to losing," he said.

Cox, 60, leaves with a 503-83 record over the past 20 years. His Jaguars won a national championship in 1990 and Illinois state titles in 1986, 1990 and 1993.

One Hit Wonder

(Larry "Chief" Farrell & The Michigantown Ganders)

The Early Years

Larry Farrell was born in August of 1894 at Fayette, Indiana, a small hamlet near the Boone County-Hendricks County line.

The O'Farrells came from Ireland to Massachusetts probably at the time of the "Great Potato Famine", circa 1850.

Larry's mother and father, James and Winifred, came to Boone County by way of Chicago. James was a county supervisor and business man in Fayette.

Being the eldest son, Larry was packed off at age 12 for St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer to become a priest.

The predecessor of the college was a Catholic orphanage under the management of the Bishop of Ft. Wayne, Reverend Joseph Dwenger. Bishop Dwenger later offered the orphan's home and several hundred surrounding acres of rich farmland to the Precious Blood Fathers for a college and seminary. There is still a Dwenger Hall at St. Joe and a high school in Ft. Wayne named in his honor.

After about ten years Larry left the seminary and went into teaching. Eventually, he went to Indiana University to get his teaching certificate, but like many college students of the time he ended up in the U. S. Army under General Black Jack Pershing on the Mexican border, vainly seeking Pancho Villa.

A Teacher and Coach

Eventually, he did receive his teaching certificate and at World War I's end got his first teaching assignment at Washington Twp. (Clinton Co.), better known as Little Jeff.

It was there that young Mr. Farrell met another teacher, a Presbyterian, Dorothy Riegle. They soon overcame their mutual suspicions between Calvinists and Papists and married. About the same time, Larry obtained another teaching job at Michigantown that included some extra income to teach bas-

ketball. One of his offsprings, Patty, remembers, as a child, sitting on the bench with her father at Michigantown trying to deal with the live Gander mascot.

His first season was in 1923-24. With modest material and meager facilities, Farrell turned out winning teams year after year. Then in 1933 with four senior starters and a junior he produced his finest team. Although not playing a knockout schedule the Ganders finished the 1933 regular season at 22-0. Below is their ledger.

With Wayne Gregg, Glynn Downey and Forest Stoops leading the way (all scored over 200 points), the Ganders eliminated Kirklin (53-9), Frankfort (16-10) and Washington Twp. (27-26), thus becoming the first Clinton County team other than Frankfort to ever win a sectional. However, Washington Twp. Farrell's former school, whom Michigantown had beaten decisively three times previously scared the daylight out of the Ganders. Washington's Mitchell scored a basket just prior to the buzzer, but the officials had called a jump ball before he got the shot off.

A Blizzard In Crawfordsville by Bob Whalen

In 1965 the only Crawfordsville sectional ever delayed by snow was played. Of the 8 teams participating only New Ross (19-2) and New Market (11-8) had winning records.

Two games were played on Wednesday, but on Thursday the snow started coming down. By game time nearly every road was closed, thus the games were postponed until the next day. But on Friday with the snow still blanketing the area, the games were once more stopped. By Saturday the roads had been cleared and two more games played. This left Crawfordsville, Darlington, New Ross and Waynetown to vie for the championship on Monday, March 1.

C'ville and New Ross won the two afternoon games. For these two schools, playing against each other in the sectional was nothing new. In the previous 12 years, these foes had met seven times with Crawfordsville winning four of the games.

This year Crawfordsville prevailed again 72-68. Then in 1967 New Ross knocked off the Athenians 78-75. This would be their last meeting.

The sectional series between the two schools went to C'ville 5 to 4. This wasn't too bad of a discrepancy considering the fact that New Ross was one of the two smallest schools in Montgomery County.

This Montgomery County fiasco was not an isolated occurrence in Indiana this particular year. The blizzard hit 70% of Indiana, playing havoc with most sectional sites.

In 1978 and 1979 almost the same circumstances prevailed.

The Regional

Lebanon after three early state titles had gone through some hard times, but were regaining some momentum under third year coach, Paul "Butch" Neuman. The construction of a new 2,000 seat goalery had been completed in 1931 and the Tigers had been rewarded with the 1933 regional. It was to be their first and last.

The Tigers disposed of Boone County native, Abie Masters' Lafayette Jefferson Bronchos with ease, but in the final they fell victim to Larry's Ganders (30-42).

Gregg led the regional scorers with 30 points. He later, became assistant principal at Frankfort High School. Downey (13) went on to play two years at Purdue for "Piggy" Lambert. Stoops (24) made the All-State honorable list put out by the Indianapolis Star.

State Finals

Next came the 16 team state finals (the format in these days). This year's version was sprinkled with four tiny schools. Along with Michigantown were Beaver Dam, Hazelton and Wakarusa. However, these four people's choices went down in the first round with the Ganders losing to Cliff Wells' Logansport Berries.

Nonetheless, Larry "Chief" Farrell and his Michigantown Ganders ended a fantastic season at 27-1, the very best in the school's history.

Moving On

Farrell coached the Ganders for two more years, but now with three children

and a wife, he gave up coaching (he thought) and took a more secure and better paying job at Frankfort, teaching Latin and mathematics. Among his many Latin students was one Roger Robison. For the next ten years, however, he would have more than a passing interest in basketball.

He called everyone "Chief" and was known for having an Irish temper. One legend at FHS has him throwing a non-compliant student through a door. He was a great coach, a great teacher, a great story teller (like all true Irishmen), a World War I veteran, a scholar, a gentleman, a lover of nature and in general a true Renaissance Man.

A Controversial Matter

An addendum to Larry Farrell's career has to do with a story written by Douglas Boggs another of his Latin students. This editor got possession of the story a few years ago. I found it to be interesting and somewhat intriguing. Whether it is entirely true or not will be left to your discretion. Following is a short synopsis of what took place.

As previously mentioned, Farrell had assumed his coaching career to be concluded. But in 1942 Everett Case went into the U. S. Navy and Larry was asked to coach the Frankfort Hot Dogs. After winning 3 sectionals and a regional in 3 years he was fired as coach. The reason, supposedly, was because three school officials asked him to lose the 1945 sectional and he refused. The possible scenarios for the request were: (1) that Frankfort wanted to deemphasize sports and concentrate on academics or (2) they didn't want Larry becoming too successful so that there would be no problem with them letting him go when Everett Case returned.

Having been a basketball player at Lebanon and having Frankfort as our number one adversary I tend to be bias and believe the story. But Frankfort grad and coauthor of this article, Roger Robison doesn't seem to believe much of it to be true. However, there are two other ex-Frankfort students - Gene Sibray (member of the '45 team) and Methodist Pastor, Larry Shaver referred to in the article. They seem to lean the other way.
